From the President's Desk

It can be recalled that we have arranged several webinars amid severe CORONA titled "IBCCI Digital Get-Together" on 27th June 2020; "Doing Business with Bangladesh Opportunities and Challenges" on 29 June 2020; "India-Bangladesh Partnership– Economic revival in a post-Covid-19 world" on 11 August 2020; "Connectivity for Growth; Prosperity and Development" on 20 August 2020; "India-Bangladesh MSME Startup Ecosystem-Coming of Age", 25th September 2020; "India-Bangladesh Virtual Conference on Textiles and Apparel Sector" on 30 September 2020; "Tripura Spices and BSM" on 16th October 2020 to discuss how leveraging bilateral partnership, multilateral forums and potential domestic policies could help India and Bangladesh mitigate the economic fallout of COVID-19.

IBCCI underline the need for more integration, cohesion, capacity building and knowledge sharing in the expedition for life against coronavirus pandemic that would be proved most effective in curving the aggregated benefits. Bangladesh and India could climb up the global and regional value chains by further integrating their economies. India and Bangladesh have an opportunity to capitalize on the changing global order, uncertainty in the market and the unfavourable global sentiment towards China. The pandemic has led to serious discussion on the changing global order and has hinted towards a breakaway from China and its manufacturing sector. With several countries shifting their productions out of China and into other Southeast and South Asian countries, India-Bangladesh can benefit from this situation.

Bangladesh, India Extend Inland Water Transit and Trade Protocol

The second addendum on Protocol on Inland Water Transit and Trade between Bangladesh and India was signed on Wednesday morning at the Secretariat. Five more ports of call and two Indo Bangladesh Protocol (IBP) water routes were added in the protocol.

Riva Ganguly Das, High Commissioner of India in Bangladesh on behalf of the Republic of India, and Mohammed Mezbah Uddin Chowdhury, Secretary of Ministry of Shipping, on behalf of the People's Republic of Bangladesh, signed the addendum.

The Protocol was first signed in 1972, immediately after the independence of Bangladesh. It was last renewed in 2015 for five years, with a provision of automatic renewal for a further period of five years, providing long term assurance to various stakeholders.

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Two new routes

The number of Indo Bangladesh Protocol (IBP) routes has been increased from 8 to 10. New locations have also been added to existing routes.

Inclusion of the Sonamura- Daudkandi stretch of Gumti river (93 km) as IBP route numbers 9 and 10 in the Protocol will improve the connectivity of Tripura and adjoining states with the economic centers of Bangladesh and India, and will help the hinterland of both the countries.

Five more ports of call

Under the current protocol, there are six ports of call in each of India and Bangladesh. They are Kolkata, Haldia, Karimganj, Pandu, Shilghat, and Dhubri on the Indian side; Narayanganj, Khulna, Mongla, Sirajganj, Ashuganj, and Pangaon on the Bangladeshi side.

The five newly added ports of call on the Indian side are: Dhulian, Maia, Kolaghat, Sonamura, and

Jogigopha; on Bangladesh side are the new ports are Rajshahi, Sultanganj, Chilmari, Daudkandi, and Bahadurabad.

A further two additional ports of call – Tribeli (Bandel) and Badarpur on the Indian side, and Ghorasal and Muktarpur on the Bangladeshi side – have been added through this addendum, increasing the total number of ports of call to eleven and extended ports of call to two in both the countries.

Inclusion of Jogigopha in India and Bahadurabad in Bangladesh as new ports of call will provide connectivity to Meghalaya, Assam, and Bhutan.

Regarding the Protocol, on a separate press release, the High Commission of India said, "It is expected that these additions to the protocol will greatly facilitate the bilateral trade, with improved reliability and cost-effectiveness for the business community and the people of both the countries." Burimari land port to resume activities from Wednesday

The decision was taken on Monday at a meeting held between Bangladeshi and Indian businessmen

Import and export activities through the Burimari land port in Patgram Upazila of Lalmonirhat will resume from June 10 ensuring compliance with all government directives and health rules.

The decision was taken on Monday at the meeting held between Bangladeshi and Indian businessmen in the presence of BGB, BSF, customs, police and port officials concerned of both countries at the zero lines in the port check post area.

The meeting decided to resume import-export activities from Wednesday the Burimari land port after more than two and a half months since the suspension of normal activities there in the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic, reports BSS.

President of Burimari Land Port Importers-Exporters Association and Patgram Upazila Chairman Md Ruhul Amin Babul led the 10-member Bangladeshi business team while General Secretary of Changrabandha Export Association Bimal Saha led the 10-member Indian business delegation.

Among others, customs officials, deputy directors of the land ports, officers-in-charge of the respective police stations and land port immigration check posts, leaders of the Customs Clearing and Forwarding Agents' Associations were also present in the meeting.

After emerging from the meeting at 4 pm, President of Burimari Land Port Importers-Exporters Association Ruhul Amin Babul told reporters that the discussions between Bangladeshi and Indian traders were held in a very cordial atmosphere.

"The meeting took unanimous decision to start import-export activities through the Burumari land port daily from 8 am to 3 pm from Wednesday

Delivering the keynote speech, the State Minister of External Affairs of India said, "Bangladesh has been the biggest South-Asian ally. The leaders of both the nation have undertaken several infrastructural transformational projects that have incurred business growth in terms of import and export between the countries. We have seen a fruitful relation within the power and energy sector and both the nation can capitalize on so much more."

Mr Muhammad Imran, the Bangladesh High Commissioner to India; Mr Chandrajit Banerjee, Director General, CII; Mr David Rasquinha, Managing Director, Exim Bank of India; also delivered key justifications of bilateral trade between the two nations in their speech.

Bangladesh Railway (BR) officials from Pakshi received the locomotives which were commissioned from 2012 to 2015 at the Darsana-Gede interchange point around 3pm.

Sujon said the government has taken initiative to increase the number of locomotives for BR considering increasing demand for passenger trains and cargo services following increase of trade and business activities.

He said as the BR has already purchased coaches and took initiatives to ensure supply of locomotives from India to meet the demand. The issue was also discussed during his official visit to Indian in August last year.

Road widening project for trade with India okayed

The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecne) on Tuesday cleared seven projects, including a Tk 846-crore one to widen Baraiyarhat-Heyanko-Ramgarh road under Chittagong and Khagrachhari districts, aiming to boost export-import between Bangladesh and India.

The approval came from the 5th Ecne meeting of the current fiscal year held virtually with Ecne Chairperson and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair.

Sheikh Hasina chaired the meeting from her official Ganobhaban residence while Planning Minister MA Mannan also attended the meeting from there. Ministers, state ministers and secretaries concerned joined the meeting from the NEC Conference Room in the city's Sher-e-Bangla Nagar area.

Of the total project cost, Tk 2,619.79 crore will be borne from the government exchequer, while the remaining Tk 862.18 crore from foreign sources either

as loan or grant as the World Bank will provide Tk 260.98 crore as grant. Briefing the reporters after the meeting, Planning Minister MA Mannan said, "A total of 7 projects were approved today (Tuesday). Of the approved seven projects, six are new while another is a revised project.

He said the Roads and Highways Department under the Road Transport and Highways Division will implement the road widening project at Ramgarhupazila in Khagrachhari by June 2022. Of the total project cost of Taka 845.53 crore, Taka 581.20 crore will come from the Indian Line of Credit. He said once this road with Tripura of India is developed and improved, the trade and commerce alongside export and import between Bangladesh and India especially between Tripura and Chattogram and Cox's Bazar would get a boost.

"It will be a win-win situation for both India and Bangladesh," he added. Mannan said the Prime Minister during the meeting directed the authorities

concerned not to include the component of building a duckbunglo (rest house) under the project, rather to come up with an integrated project to build duckbunglos and rest houses where those are deemed to be needed. There is a possibility to develop a border-haat in Ramgarh as the project is expected to help develop the possible border market as well, he added.

At the Ecnec meeting, the Prime Minister dropped the proposal for the construction of a rest house spending Tk 2.79 crore from the project. She rather suggested that there could be a separate project for the construction of rest houses across the country

where these are essential across, Mannan said.

The other projects approved in the meeting are replacing the narrow and risky and old concrete bridges and bailey bridges with new concrete bridges on the highways under Khulna Roads Zone with Taka 526.42 crore, Protecting Dhulia Lunchghat under BaufalUpazila in Patuakhali and Durgapasha under BakerganjUpazila in Barishal from the river erosion of Tentulia with Taka 712.21 crore, Removing water logging at Kapotakshya River, 2nd phase with Taka 531.07 crore and Emergency multi-sector Rohingya crisis response project, 1st revised, with Taka 261.31 crore. India: Container train service with Bangladesh to boost trade ties

The first container train arrived from India via Benapole-Petrapole rail link carrying FMCG cargo and fabrics loaded in 50 containers, and those were handed over to Bangladesh on Sunday

India has said the newly-introduced container train service will substantially boost business and trade between Bangladesh and India.

The first container train arrived from India via Benapole-Petrapole rail link carrying FMCG cargo and fabrics loaded in 50 containers, and those were handed over to Bangladesh on Sunday.

With this newly-introduced container train service, a "huge opportunity" has opened up for bilateral trade via rail, said the High Commission.

The first container train was flagged off from the Container Corporation of India Ltd's (CONCOR) terminal at Majerhat, Kolkata, India and it was received at Benapole station.

The container train service will be a permanent service connecting the nominated Inland Container Depots and Terminals of Container Corporation of India Ltd in India and various stations in Bangladesh Railway's system.

Container train service is an additional service which is going to transport cargo by rail other than the traditional freight trains service and the recently-introduced parcel train service.

To start the container train service, Container Corporation of India and the Bangladesh Container Company Ltd signed an MoU during the visit of Prime

Minister Sheikh Hasina to India in April 2017.

A trial run of the first container train from Kolkata to Bangabandhu Bridge West station (BBW) was successfully conducted on April 3, 2018.

With the emergence of Covid-19 pandemic, now there has been a disruption in the supply chain.

Bangladesh-India inland waterways can become vital, cost-effective connectivity: experts

The two cross-border intercity express trains between Bangladesh and India will run a day more in a week as the services start from February. Well-developed waterways, as part of a larger multimodal connectivity setup, can ensure good water resource management,



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which is also a prerequisite for agricultural growth, they said at the inaugural webinar of Asian Confluence NADI conversations organised by Asian Confluence, a premier Indian think tank based in Shillong on Wednesday.



Inland waterways development between Bangladesh and India can become a vital and cost-effective way of multimodal connectivity that can improve the economic wellbeing of people from both countries, policymakers and experts have said.

“When we talk of the 54 transboundary rivers of Bangladesh and India, we talk of an opulent harvest of fusing culture, crafts and trade developed over generations,” said State Minister for Foreign Affairs M Shahriar Alam.

“Rivers are part of our common heritage which we must cherish for our nourishment,” he said, stressing on the importance of water security and the livelihood of the communities living along the rivers as the two countries talk of improved water resources management and inland waterways.

Webinar on "Connectivity for Growth, Prosperity and Development" 20 August 2020

High Commission of India (HCI), Dhaka in collaboration with India-Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce & Industry (IBCCI) jointly organized a webinar to discuss "Connectivity for Growth, Prosperity and Development" on 20 August 2020. More than 150 industry leaders attended the webinar.

Chief Guest for the Webinar, Hon'ble Minister of Commerce, Government of Bangladesh, H.E. Tipu Munshi, MP in his address, spoke on the special and very close relations between India and Bangladesh. He highlighted that enhanced connectivity will help Bangladesh achieve its SDG targets faster along with economic development. He fondly remembered his visit to Meghalaya and Assam last year and the interest of the business community of India to have more connectivity, especially through the waterways.

Speaking on the occasion, High Commissioner of India Smt. Riva Ganguly Das said, "Connectivity has been an important focus of our (India-Bangladesh) mutually beneficial bilateral relation". She added India has opened its huge markets to Bangladesh under SAFTA since 2011 wherein, Bangladesh exporters are provided Duty-Free and Quota Free market access for 100 % tariff lines except for alcohol and tobacco. Bangladesh exports registered a significant growth of 42.91 % in FY 2018-19. She highlighted that both the governments have commissioned a joint study for a bilateral Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement which is likely to be completed this year. The early green shoots of economic recovery are visible both in India and Bangladesh and having

Bangladesh to export 1,475 tonnes of hilsa to India for Durga Puja

The government has decided to send 1,475 tonnes of hilsa fish to India as a gesture of goodwill on the occasion of Durga Puja, an annual Hindu festival, and has already given the go-ahead to nine exporters to begin shipments from the next week.

The commerce ministry shared the info via a circular issued on September 10.

"It's a Durga Puja gift for the people of India," said Nargis Murshida, deputy secretary (export-2) of the commerce ministry.

"Last year, we allowed the export of 500 tonnes of hilsa fish," she added.



Hilsa, the national fish of Bangladesh, is mainly exported from the Pathorghata, Bhola, Barishal, Kalapara districts of Barishal division and from Chandpur under Chattogram division.

Exporters from different parts of the country purchase the fish from these areas before shipping them abroad.

Around 200 people have applied for permission to export hilsa this year but only nine got the opportunity, said Nirab Hossain Tutul, president of the Barishal Matso Arotdar Samity, a local committee of fish wholesalers.

Hilsa fish of 800 to 1,200 grams in size will be exported this year, said Tutul, who is the only local exporter to be included in the list of nine exporters.

However, the per kilogram price of the fish is yet to be fixed.

Export of these fishes to India's West Bengal through Benapole port will continue until October 10, according to the traders and exporters at Barishal.


At present, various preparations are ongoing. This year, the exporters have to operate under quarantine orders from the authorities concerned to ensure that the fishes are safe and do not spread Covid-19.

Meanwhile, the price of hilsa at local markets increased as soon as the news of the new export order was released, Tutul said. In local markets, each kilogramme of hilsa fish is now selling at Tk 850 to Tk 900 while it was Tk 750 a week ago, he added.


Over 80 per cent of the hilsa fish which will be exported to India this year will come from the Barishal



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belt, according to Ajit Kumar Das Manu, a local hilsa trader.

“Last year, 350 tonnes out of the 500 tonnes shipped to India came from Barishal,” Manu said.

Hilsa production has increased in Barishal in recent

times thanks to strict supervision and widespread campaigns from the government to protect and allow the fishes to grow bigger, said Bimol Chandra Das, district fisheries officer (hilsa). *(Courtesy: The Daily Star, 14th September 2020)*

India's first Covid-19 vaccine candidate approved for phase III trials

The alarming rise in the number of coronavirus cases in India has surely raised a lot of concern amongst people. Amidst all this chaos, Covaxin, the vaccine candidate developed by Bharat Biotech India Limited (BBIL) in collaboration with Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), has received approvals from India's drug control authority for the initiation of the final phase of trials, reports Times of India.

Almost three months back in July, BBIL was allowed to hold phase I and phase II of the human clinical trials. Since then, the number of coronavirus cases in India has risen up to 7.5 million, making India the second-highest affected country in the world.

With the approvals at hand, the phase III trials are likely to start next month. The committee reviewing the vaccine candidate met on Tuesday and gave the approvals suggesting minor changes to the process.

Covaxin is the first indigenous vaccine candidate by India to fight against the novel coronavirus, developed by Bharat Biotech India (BBIL), Hyderabad-based biotechnology firm working closely with the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) and the National Institute of Virology (NIV).

Covaxin falls under the category of inactivated vaccines, which means the virus pathogen is 'deactivated' and has no possibility of infecting a person or multiplying in number, as it is already dead.

According to the firm, "The SARS-CoV-2 strain was isolated in NIV, Pune and transferred to Bharat Biotech. The indigenous inactivated vaccine was developed and manufactured in Bharat Biotech's BSL-3 (Bio-Safety Level 3) High Containment facility located in Genome Valley, Hyderabad, India."

Therefore, the vaccine just serves the immune system as a dead virus and mounts an antibody response towards the virus. (Courtesy: The Daily Asian Age 23th October 2020)

We mourn his death and express our heartfelt condolence to the members of the bereaved family.

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
